- 1. Global health Annual virtual symposium in 2026: In collaboration with IPNA's Low Resource Countries, we are planning to continue an annual virtual symposium in 2026 devoted to pediatric nephrology in low resource settings.
- 2. In collaboration with IPNA's we are aiming to improve and provide education resources to the providers and communities in low resourced settings worldwide
- 3. We will continue to increase opportunities for ASPN members to participate in pediatric nephrology education, clinical care, mentorship, and research in low resource settings in relation to the tri-lateral partnership between ASPN, IPNA, and Health Volunteers Overseas (HVO)
- 4. Brainstorm new ideas to strengthen the Global health Committees goals.
- 5. We will continue to support the ASPN-IPNA-ALANEPE partnership to support pediatric nephrology in Haiti.

Activities/Progress towards Goals:

- 1. Last Annual ASPN-IPNA Global Health Symposium April 2024 Lead: Erica Bjornstad, Assisting Lead: Asif Mansuri
 - a. 2024's symposium occurred successfully on April 3, 2024. The largest to date with >170 attendants. We had several non-nephrologists in attendance as well.
 - b. Several ASPN and IPNA members served on the planning committee.
 - c.2024 theme was: Task Shifting Basic Nephrology to General Pediatricians: Beyond UTIs; with keynote speaker, Mignon McCulloch
 - d. No Annual Symposium in 2025 due to IPNA Congress in Feb 2025
 - e. We will continue planning for 2026 Global health symposium
- 2. ASPN-IPNA-HVO trilateral partnership (Cambodia) Lead: Dorey Glenn, Assisting Lead: Anisha Gerber
 - a. Platform designed/curated by HVO, which allowed recording lectures, and other resources for future use. 31 virtual sessions occurred from 2021-2024.
 - b. New update We had 1 ASPN volunteer.
 - c. Dr. Larry Greenbaum visited 3 HVO sites (Cambodia, Loas, and Bhutan) over two separate trips.
 - d. His visits were of great value to the local pediatricians and included clinical teaching, didactics, and strengthening institutional and professional relationships.
 - e.Dr. Greenbaum worked to strengthen ties with IPNA programming at these sites as well.
 - f. We hope to welcome additional ASPN volunteers to these sites.
 - g.Continue virtual education/lectures.
- 3. Local-global Partnership (Haiti) Lead: Ankana Daga
 - a. Overall, the political/violent situation in Haiti has only continued to worsen, despite the lack of news coverage. It has greatly limited these efforts but we remain committed to supporting our partnerships with IPNA, ALANEPE and Dr. Exantus. We have been able to continue to engage when internet/safety permits participation in our global health efforts.
 - b. Ongoing discussions with IPNA and ALANEPE on supporting Dr. Judith Exantus, sole pediatric nephrologist of Haiti, as they recover from recent natural and man-made disasters (hurricanes, earthquake, political unrest, gang violence).
 - c. In the past we discussed considering sending supplies during recent hurricane and earthquake, and an ongoing needs assessment with Dr. Exantus





1. Collaborative and Supportive Peer Support Group for Pediatric Nephrology Division Heads

The primary goal of this Interest Group (IG) is to foster a collaborative environment where Division Heads in Pediatric Nephrology can connect, share resources, and provide mutual support. By building a network of Division Heads, we aim to create an open space for discussing challenges, sharing strategies, and offering advice on leadership, recruitment and team building, addressing common problems faced by our field.

2. Assessment of Current State of Pediatric Nephrology Divisions across N. America

To better understand the current landscape of Pediatric Nephrology divisions, an in-depth survey was conducted focusing on identifying key metrics such as staffing levels, clinical service delivery, research output, and educational programs. The goal was to collect data that will serve as a baseline to assess the strengths, challenges, and opportunities facing Pediatric Nephrology divisions nationwide.

3. Identify Shared Issues and Develop Common Solutions

By analyzing survey results and engaging in peer discussions, we aim to identify common issues across divisions. Whether these are related to clinical workforce or workflows, funding challenges, or training deficits, we will focus on formulating actionable solutions. Through this collaborative problem-solving, we hope to improve practice standards, advocate for necessary resources, and streamline administrative processes.

4. Serve as a Communication Platform for Dissemination through Divisions

This Interest Group will act as a conduit for the dissemination of important information and best practices throughout the Pediatric Nephrology community. We will foster ongoing discussions about policy changes or external factors that may impact the field.

Activities/Progress towards Goals:

For Goal 1:

We are continuing to expand the network of Division Heads, with new members joining each quarter. Meetings remain well-received, and the group is steadily growing in engagement.

For Goal 2

The in-depth survey has been completed, vetted by a subgroup, and distributed to all Division Heads. The analysis of both quantitative and qualitative responses has provided a comprehensive view of current division operations. The results have been accepted for publication in AJKD and are currently in press.

For Goal 3:

Agenda items for meetings are set both by myself and the attendees, often reflecting hot topics that generate robust conversations and constructive dialogue. Center chiefs have received mentorship and counsel from fellow chiefs, with reported positive outcomes.

For Goal 4:

The ASPN Workforce Committee and Council have actively engaged with the group to disseminate surveys and discuss relevant issues. Additionally, the International Pediatric Nephrology Association (IPNA) has utilized this group for advocacy efforts aimed at securing resources for underserved countries.

Conclusion:

The ASPN Division Head Interest Group is making strong progress toward meeting its goals of fostering collaboration, assessing the current state of divisions, and problem-solving. By continuing to promote open communication and peer support, we aim to elevate the standard of care across Pediatric Nephrology divisions while addressing shared workforce challenges and working toward innovative solutions.

Goals

The goals of the ASPN Kidney Genetics Interest Group are to:

- 1. Create a community for pediatric nephrologists involved in kidney genetics or interested in learning more about genetic testing for kidney disease
- 2. Discuss best practices for genetic testing in kidney disease
- 3. Gather insights from others on the logistics of running a kidney genetics clinic and sharing ideas for clinic models
- 4. Discuss interesting and difficult cases in determining genetic diagnoses for kidney disease or how to handle variants of uncertain significance
- 5. Discuss ethics of genetic testing in pediatric patients, including insurance implications and genetic counseling
- 6. Expanding research in kidney genetics

Activities/Progress towards Goals:

The Kidney Genetics Interest Group started this year and has already generated a collaborative network, as evidenced by the first meeting on February 6 which brought together 12 providers from 8 different institutions. Discussions during this initial gathering centered on practical aspects of running kidney genetics clinics, the benefits and challenges of specific genetic testing approaches such as the Renasight panel and exome/genome sequencing, and strategies for integrating genetics into various clinical settings, including prenatal care and kidney transplantation. The diverse research interests shared by the attendees highlight the breadth of expertise within the group and promises opportunity for future collaborations aimed at advancing the field of kidney genetics. Planned future meetings will build upon this foundation by delving into specific genetic tests, complex clinical scenarios, and important ethical considerations. We are currently planning to build a comprehensive set of resources related to kidney genetics including a clinic directory, researcher expertise, specialized testing and clinical trials. Our next meeting on May 29 will feature Dr. Alex Keefe from Seattle Children's Hospital, a clinical geneticist co-leading their renal genetics clinic, who will provide a framework for nephrologists to effectively utilize genetic testing in kidney disease by comparing gene panels and WES/WGS, identifying clinical indicators for broader testing, presenting cases and discussing ethical considerations like ACMG secondary findings.





JELF Advocacy Scholars Program

Over the past year, the advocacy and policy series featured a range of impactful sessions. On **September 19, 2024**, Amy Gibson led a compelling discussion on *Private Equity in Medicine and the Advocacy* Issues in the "House of Medicine." The ASPN's John E. Lewy Foundation Advocacy Scholars (JELF) program publishes regular updates from its scholars, who describe their two-year immersive advocacy training. Recent posts detail how scholars are engaging with healthcare policy issues—such as proposed Medicaid cuts—advocating at institutional, state, and national levels, participating in virtual Hill Day to lobby Congress on budgetary appropriations, building grassroots coalitions, and reflecting on how broader issues like immigration affect kidney equity and care. These updates emphasize the hands-on learning, mentorship, and real-world policy work central to the JELF experience.

Purpose

The program develops future leaders in pediatric nephrology with expertise in U.S. governmental and regulatory processes and advocacy. It offers a two-year immersive experience in leadership and advocacy skill development.

Eligibility

Applicants must be ASPN members in good standing with an interest in public policy and advocacy for children with kidney disease. Priority is given to those within 10 years of fellowship completion. Diversity in institution, geography, and background is encouraged. Awardees must participate fully in the program, serve on ASPN advocacy committees, and present their experiences at the ASPN Annual Meeting. Non-U.S. applicants are welcome, though training is U.S. system-focused; financial support will be equivalent to U.S. awardees.

Awards

Up to two Advocacy Scholar awards are granted annually. Each supports attendance at two national conferences plus a mentored, hands-on experience with ASPN leaders and the Society's Washington representative.
